


One WIOA Youth's Story:

Jane is a 19 year old woman who has been in foster care since she was very young. As a result of her not being in placement when she turned 18 she is not eligible for many services offered to ex-foster youth when they transition out on their own. She has struggled to find employment and suitable housing for over a year.

Jane is homeless, has been couch surfing for approximately 5 months and is currently living in her Uncle’s truck. She believed that she had a HS diploma since they allowed her to attend graduation but in fact she had not passed her California Academic High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE). She has also tested below the 9th grade level in reading, math and language.

Since Jane's enrollment in WIA she started working part-time in a local restaurant. She has confidence in her work skills and feels she is a great addition to her work team. In fact, she has asked for additional work hours and when she was told she had to "prove herself", she took on the challenge her employer said she was the fastest trainee and earned the hours she requested!

Jane wants to be self-sufficient and earn enough money to pay for housing and her basic needs. While working with the Employment Specialist she has decided that she would like to pursue a career in Medical Assisting. The RCS Youth Employment Specialist has been tutoring Jane for her CAHESE, encouraging her career goals and assisting her in her search for affordable housing. The Arbor has provided her an address to receive mail and she can use the computers for email and to meet other needs.
